Lincoln High School

It was a banner year for the Lincoln High School Lions, excelling in academic, athletic, and extracurricular activities. As a school, LHS took the RIIL Spirit Challenge for the 2nd year in a row, won the RIIL-sponsored Peanut Butter Express competition for the 5th year in a row, and was named the 2024 RIAAA (RI Athletic Administrators Assoc.) George Nasuti School of the Year. With overall programmatic improvements in career and technical education, LHS added two new programs in Computer Science and Audio Engineering to accompany the current outstanding programs in place. As part of their coursework, students at LHS achieved national honors, with the LHS Samsung Solve for Tomorrow team becoming the state representative at the national level, and two students, Joseph Conti and Austin Noel, being named national semifinalists in the Modeling the Future actuarial contest.

LHS athletic teams were named champions in multiple sports, including *an undefeated season in Field Hockey, the Boys Basketball Division II championship, and winning the Division II/III Wrestling sectional title.* Some individual accolades included:

- Lauren Cipriano, Cam DiChiara, and Wayne McNamara being 1000 point basketball scorers
- Cam and Wayne becoming the two highest scoring players in LHS basketball history
- Wayne McNamara being named the RI Gatorade Basketball Player of the Year
- Aaron Bolduc joining the 100+ matches won club in Wrestling
- Holden Brown within the Division 1 swimming championship in the 100 freestyle and 200 IM
- Tyler Durang becoming the winter season state shot put champion

Additional honors included:

- Sofia Ramos being named the Providence Journal Student of the Week
- Evan Boulay being named the NFHS (National Federation of High Schools) Heart of the Arts Award winner for Section 1 (won of 9 national finalists)
- Eliza Gobin winning the WriteRI Short Story competition for her entry
- The LHS Iron Lions winning multiple awards at the state robotics competition

All of these accomplishments included a strong school culture that hosted multiple events this year at LHS, including:

- The debut of the PBS Our Town: Lincoln at LHS
- The LHS hosted the RI Dept. of Education *Menu for Success* Food Truck Event whereby our *Mane Event* Food Truck, run by members of our CTE Culinary Program, won the Commissioner's Belt for the sweet dish

LHS continues to boast some of the strongest Advanced Placement testing scores in the state and remains a top high school in Rhode Island. With 88% of our seniors attending college in the fall,

Lincoln Middle School Highlights

Lincoln Middle School experienced a productive and successful year! Our successes were a direct result of our collective Lincoln Middle School team approach and the collective/collaborative efforts of our teachers, support staff, and administration. Lincoln Middle School was dedicated to providing our students with lifelong experiences; experiences that motivated attendance and provided an experience they will unlikely forget.

ACADEMICS:

- -8th Grade Science Students ROV project. This year, 8th-grade students were tasked with designing, building, and testing underwater ROVs. The project was a big success!
- -Selected 8th-grade students participated in NAEP, which is the largest nationally representative and continuing assessment of what students know and can do in various subjects.
- -LMS hosted author Rob Buyea, author of the Mr. Terupt series, to speak and lead a workshop with our students.
- -7th-grade students hosted Mr. Angelo Maker, a former "Lost Boy" of Sudan to LMS to promote the power of perseverance, and brought literature to life by speaking about his experiences as a young boy.
- -Faculty member Alicia Moran was honored at a Providence Bruins game as an "Educator in the Spotlight", hosted by the Sargent Center for her work as a Highly Specialized Special Educator.
- -Students continued to benefit from the LMS PBIS awards system, thanks to a grant from the RI Legislature. Students are rewarded with "Lion's Bucks" that they receive when they demonstrate they are "Respectful, Responsible, and Ready to Learn". They then enter their bucks into weekly raffles for gift cards to local restaurants/stores.

EXTRACURRICULARS:

- -In October, the entire 6th Grade class went to Rhode Island College to attend the Rhode Island College Dance Company Annual Mini Concert, which is a performance linking dance to various academic disciplines along with offering students the opportunity to recognize that there are other ways to have fun, keep physically fit, and learn about culture, history, and the arts.
- -This past January, we took our LMS NJHS 8th Grade Students to Quebec, Canada.
- -In April, we also took our LMS NJHS 7th Grade Students to Washington, D.C.
- Our annual Holidays HoopFest charity event faceoff between faculty members and our middle school basketball teams was a huge success! SRO Bradley and Assistant AD Flaxington refereed the game. Faculty reclaimed the title of champions, and over \$2,000 was raised to help families in need during the holiday season.

- -8th Grade Student Elizabeth Hopkins won the Lincoln Public Schools District Spelling Bee and was featured in the Valley Breeze.
- -7th Grade Students on the Purple team hosted Master Sergeant DeSimone (parent of one of our 7th graders) and Master Sergeant Silva as they spoke about the "Honor Group". Students wrote "thank you" cards to our brave men and women serving at home and abroad.
- -Our brand new Theatre course saw successes as well, culminating in their end-of-year performance of "The Thirty-Three Little Pigs", all under the direction of Mr. Dan Pedro.

ATHLETICS:

- -8th Grade Student Francesca Justin was crowned state champion in both the 100m and 200m at the RIPCOA Outdoor Track & Field State Championships. In addition to winning the state title in both events, she also set school records in both events.
- Noah Rand placed 7th in the discus, The 4X400 relay team placed 7th which consisted of Giovani Caro, Marcus Avelar, Andrew Alves and Lucas Burdette.
- Grace Aurajo placed 7th in the 80-meter hurdles, Marieme Ndoye placed 4th in the Shot put and the 4X100 girls relay team placed 4th which consisted of Sophia Seigle, Ayla Jackson, Grace Araujo, Francesca Justin.
- -LMS hosted North Cumberland for our unified basketball game in the presence of our entire 8th grade class, representing LMS with Lion Pride! The LMS Lions were victorious!

LMS continues to provide a world-class education to our 6th-8th grade students and we look forward to seeing more successes in the years to come!

1st & 4th Grades

Center for Public Research and Leadership Curriculum Implementation Change Framework (CICF) | 2023-2024 Pilot Spring 2023

Lincoln Central and other schools and systems nationwide have adopted high-quality curricula that have the potential to strengthen teaching and learning. The Curriculum Implementation Change Framework (CICF),1 created by Columbia University's Center for Public Research and Leadership (CPRL), is a framework and suite of tools that helps teams use new curricula to advance transformational educational experiences for kids.

In the 2023-24 school year, CPRL supported select systems in piloting CICF. By participating, Lincoln Central received early access to the CICF tools, customized data revealing curriculum implementation strengths and opportunities, and targeted coaching from CPRL's research team focused on interpreting and acting on the data.

All six 1st and 4th grade teachers participated in this work along with Dr. McNamara, Mrs. Saravo and various RIDE leaders.

2nd Grade

Lincoln Central's 2nd Annual Penny Wars, led by our second-grade teacher, Mrs. Juliane Coelho and PBIS Team, was a school-wide initiative driven by a second-grade math unit that focused on counting money. Partnered with "Plates with Purpose" a local non-profit organization that strives to raise awareness around the persistence of food insecurity in RI. They work to enrich lives and assist our underserved neighbors. Working with Navigant Bank, in 2023 we were able to raise nearly \$3,400.00 and this year we raised over \$6K for this awesome organization! Click here for Valley Breeze article.





